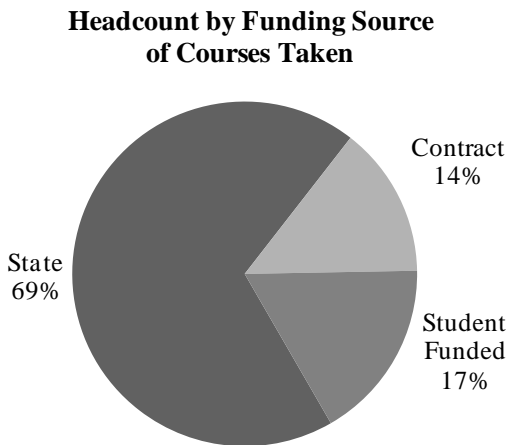

**STUDENT DATA INTRODUCTION
ACADEMIC YEAR 2002-03 TO 2006-07**

Nearly one third of a million students enrolled in courses supported by tuition and state funds allocated directly to the college system. The state-supported numbers include students enrolled in special dislocated worker programs.

About one in five students (16 percent) were enrolled only in student-funded courses where the course fee covers the entire cost of instruction.

Community and technical colleges enrolled 456,284 students in 2006-07, a one percent decrease from the previous year. A single college experienced an unusually significant increase in 2005-06 followed by a similar decline this year due to offering multiple sections of a course bearing a small credit value in 2005-06. State supported headcount for all other colleges increased by 2,234 (0.8%) and total headcount remained at nearly the same level as the prior year.



State-Supported Students: Students enrolled in at least one course funded completely or in part by legislative appropriations of state funds.

Contract-Supported Students: Students enrolled in courses funded by grants and contracts with external organizations and who were not enrolled in any state-supported courses. Also includes Running Start and Contract International students enrolled in state-supported courses.

Student-Funded Students: Students enrolled in courses funded entirely through fees charged to the students.

Note: Most students enroll exclusively in one of the three funding types: state-supported, contract-supported or student-funded.

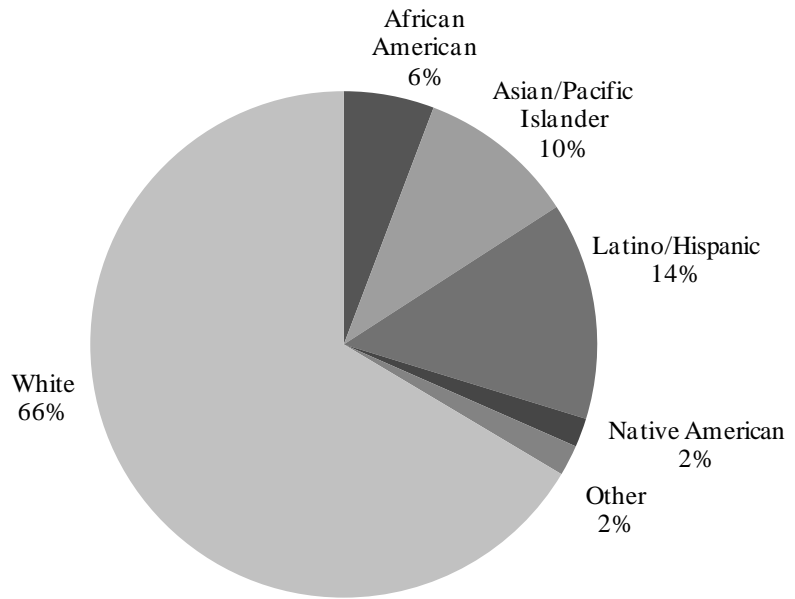

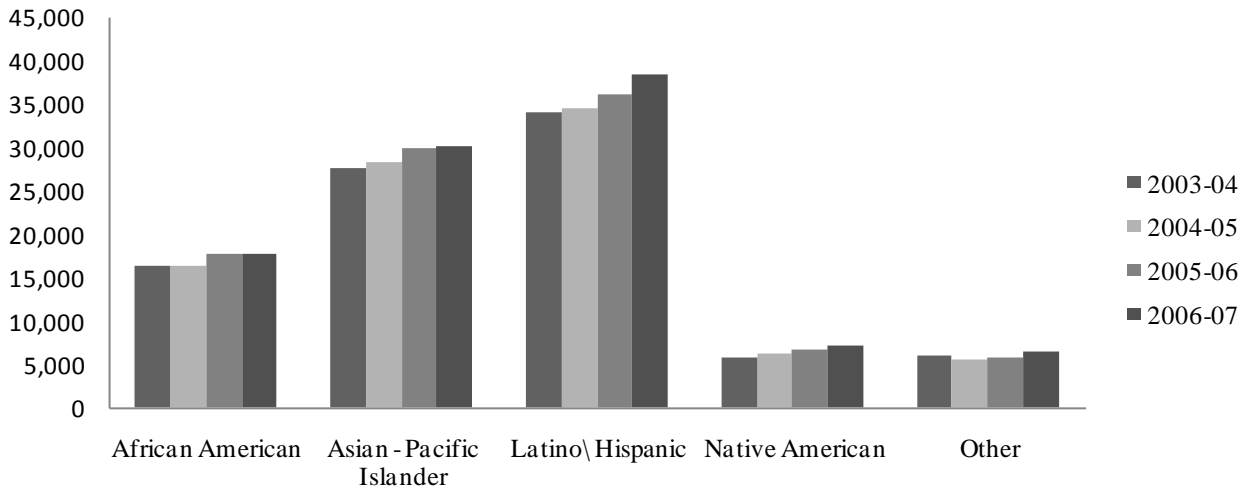
Multi-Racial: Beginning in 2003-04 students could report more than one race and ethnicity. Asian-Pacific Islander-White, African American-White and Native American -White account for over 80 percent of students reporting more than one race.

Immigrants, Refugees and Temporary Legal Residents: Community and technical colleges served 28,445 students who live in Washington as immigrants, refugees or temporary legal residents under US immigration laws.

Male/Female: Similar with colleges across the nation, the majority of students served in Washington community and technical colleges were women. In 2006-07 58 percent of all students in Washington community and technical colleges were female.

Students with Disabilities: Community and technical colleges served approximately 14,800 disabled students in 2006-07, 4.6 percent of all students. Colleges offer special services to ensure that disabled students are able to participate in college-level training. About half of the disabled students (47 percent) enrolled for job-related purposes, 32 percent were preparing for transfer, and 15 percent enrolled with basic skills classes as their final goal.

Washington community and technical colleges serve fewer disabled students than colleges nationwide. According to the 2003 Condition of Education, about 10.8 percent of those enrolled in public two-year institutions nationwide were students with disabilities, compared with Washington's 4.6 percent. An estimated 10 percent of college-age people in Washington have physical, mental or other health conditions that keep them from participating fully in work or school activities (*Washington State Population Survey, 2004*).

Part-Time / Full-Time: About 38 percent of all students enrolled full-time in 2006-07. This compares to the national percentage of 38 percent of students in two-year colleges who enroll full-time (*Digest of Education Statistics, 2003*).

**STUDENTS BY TARGETED PROGRAMS
ACADEMIC YEAR 2002-03 TO 2006-07**

Under the **Running Start** program 16,826 high school students enrolled in college classes that met high school requirements. The high school reimburses the college for the cost of instruction. Students must purchase books and supplies, and cover transportation costs on their own. There are several typical Running Start enrollment patterns – full-time at the college, part-time at both the college and the high school, and enrollment at the college for the last term of the senior year only.

Tech Prep is a program that enables high school students to earn college credit as they complete college-equivalent professional/technical courses and programs taught at the high school. Tech Prep enrollments have steadily increased, up 12 percent over the 2005-06 academic year. Factors influencing the increase include removal of fees and better outreach.

About 22 percent of Washington’s 2006-07 high school juniors and seniors participated in dual enrollment programs (Running Start, Alternative High School, College in the High School and Tech Prep).

The **Contract International** program allowed 5,407 international students to enroll in college without displacing Washington residents. These students paid the full cost of instruction.

Nine colleges offer courses in correctional facilities under contract with the state’s **Department of Corrections**.

The 10,529 Worker Retraining students (plus some 1,300 students at private career schools) were **dislocated workers** enrolled to prepare for new employment. While some of these students complete training in a quarter or two, most are enrolled full-time for an entire year or more in preparation for new jobs.

Twenty-five colleges offered Integrated Basic Education and Skills Training (**I-BEST**) programs which prepared 1,100 students for jobs in nursing and allied health care, commercial truck driving, industrial maintenance, automotive, computers and early childhood education. The program began during the 2005-06 academic year.

A total of 79,649 students (17 percent of all students) enrolled in at least one **online learning** course this year, an increase of 8.6 percent from 2005-06. Of these online learning students, 71,016, or 89 percent, enrolled in online classes.

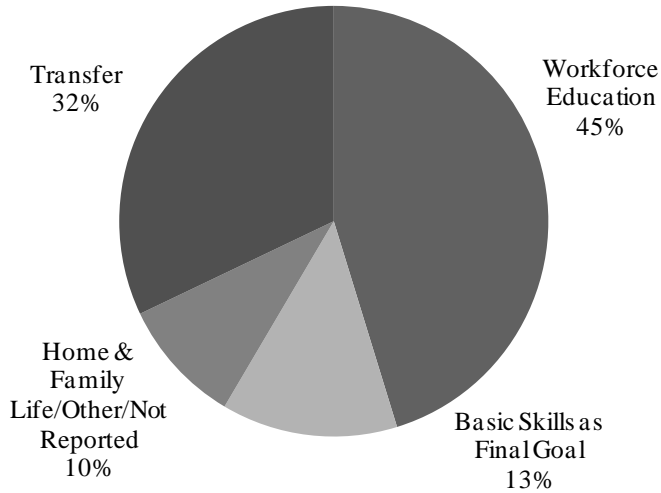

**STUDENTS BY PURPOSE FOR ATTENDING
ACADEMIC YEAR 2002-03 TO 2006-07**

More than 45 percent of all state-supported students in 2006-07 were enrolled for a workforce-related purpose. Half of the workforce education students were enrolled to upgrade their job skills and the other half were preparing for a new job. With a median age of 29, workforce education and basic skills students were older on average than students enrolled for transfer.

Over 100,000 state-supported students (32 percent) were enrolled with the goal of transferring to a four-year institution. Transfer-interest students were typically younger with a median age of 22 and enrolled full time (53 percent).

Some students in ABE, ESL, GED or high school completion courses see those courses as their final goal and have no plans for further training. In 2006-07 there were 41,533 such students in state-supported classes. The median age for basic skills was the same as workforce training students. They tend to enroll part time, with just 36 percent enrolled on a full time basis. About 70 percent of basic skills students enroll with basic skills as their final goal. Another 19,000 students took basic skills classes but enrolled for workforce training or transfer purposes and were counted in the workforce and transfer numbers.

In 2006-07, 29,620 state-supported students (10 percent) enrolled to develop parenting and consumer homemaking skills, to prepare for retirement, or did not specify a goal when they enrolled. Such students were generally enrolled part time, taking just one class during the entire year.

STUDENTS RECEIVING NEED-BASED FINANCIAL AID

The number of students receiving state or federal aid totaled 55,713. This is a decrease of 1.9 percent over the previous year in the number of students receiving aid. A decreasing percentage of students who are enrolled in eligible programs are receiving financial aid.

Not all low-income students are eligible for aid. Financial aid programs were developed in the 1950s and 1960s primarily designed for young students coming straight from high school. A recent study found that conventional aid programs usually fail to meet the needs of employed adults with full-time jobs and family responsibilities (*Held Back: How Student Aid Programs Fail Working Adults*, 2002). To receive aid, students must have financial need and be enrolled in a college-level program of study. Low-income students enrolled in Adult Basic Education or English as a Second Language classes are not eligible for aid. Those enrolled in one or two courses to upgrade job skills or meet personal interests likewise are not eligible for aid. Some 162,000 students (35 percent) are enrolled in programs which make them eligible for aid. Nationally, about 34 percent of two-year college students apply for financial aid.¹ Of those enrolled in programs eligible for aid, 36.6 percent received state or federal aid.

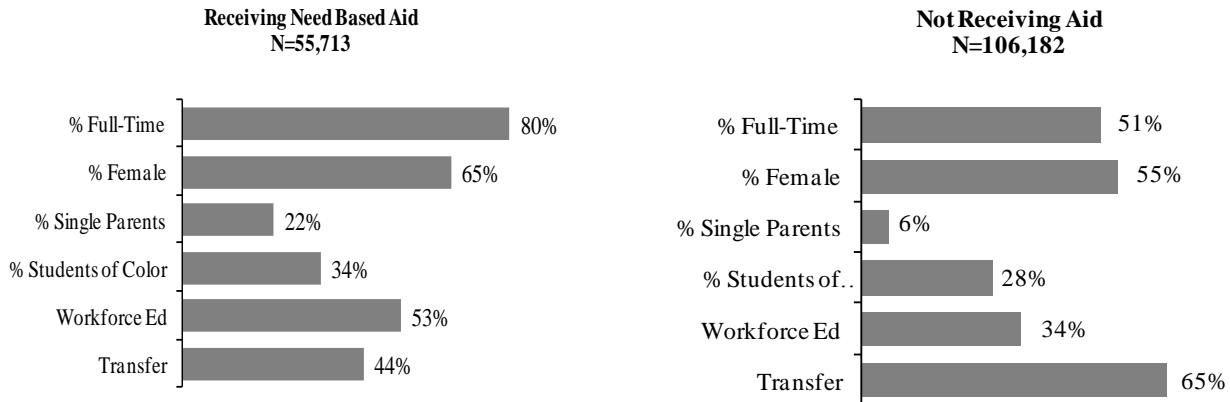
Students seeking aid in paying for college costs must apply to the financial aid office at the college. Those who apply may be eligible for loans, work study or grants, as well as scholarship programs, though most are eligible for and receive grants. The demand for grants and work study aid typically exceeds the funds available. This means that students must work to reduce expenses, find employment, or take out personal loans to fund the balance of their college expenses.

Aided students are different from non-aided students in most regards. Those aided are more likely to enroll full time for clear long-term goals related to a job or transfer. Some 22 percent of aided students are single parents. The typical aided student is a 26-year-old woman with children in her home. She is attending college full time to prepare for work. If she completes her degree or certificate, she will be the first in her family to do so.

**WELFARE REFORM
ACADEMIC YEAR 2006-07**

Washington state implemented welfare reform in 1998 with passage of WorkFirst, its version of the federal reform program, Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF). WorkFirst, as the name implies, identifies work as the primary strategy and first step to help families raise their incomes, reduce their dependence on welfare and leave poverty.

The State Board is one of four agency partners along with the departments of Social and Health Services, Employment Security and Community Development. The colleges receive a block grant to provide training that will:

- 1) Increase the number of welfare parents entering employment with higher than average entry-level wages.
- 2) Increase job placements for welfare parents with low basic skills or limited English proficiency.
- 3) Increase job placements and wage progression for other low-income parents.

Training services that are offered include: (1) Customized Job Skills Training (CJST) lasting from 8 to 22 weeks and tied to a specific industry or set of employers; (2) Tuition Assistance for working low income and welfare parents to attend college while they work and Work Study that can be done in conjunction with tuition bearing college training; (3) High Wage/High Demand Training (HWHD) that allows welfare participants to start and finish within 12 calendar months a community or technical college training program in the information technology or health care fields including any pre-requisites; and (4) Other Basic Skills and Work-Related Training for welfare participants without an immediate job placement goal referred specifically for these services only.

In 2006-07, colleges served 13,769 WorkFirst welfare and low-income adults in the block grant.
