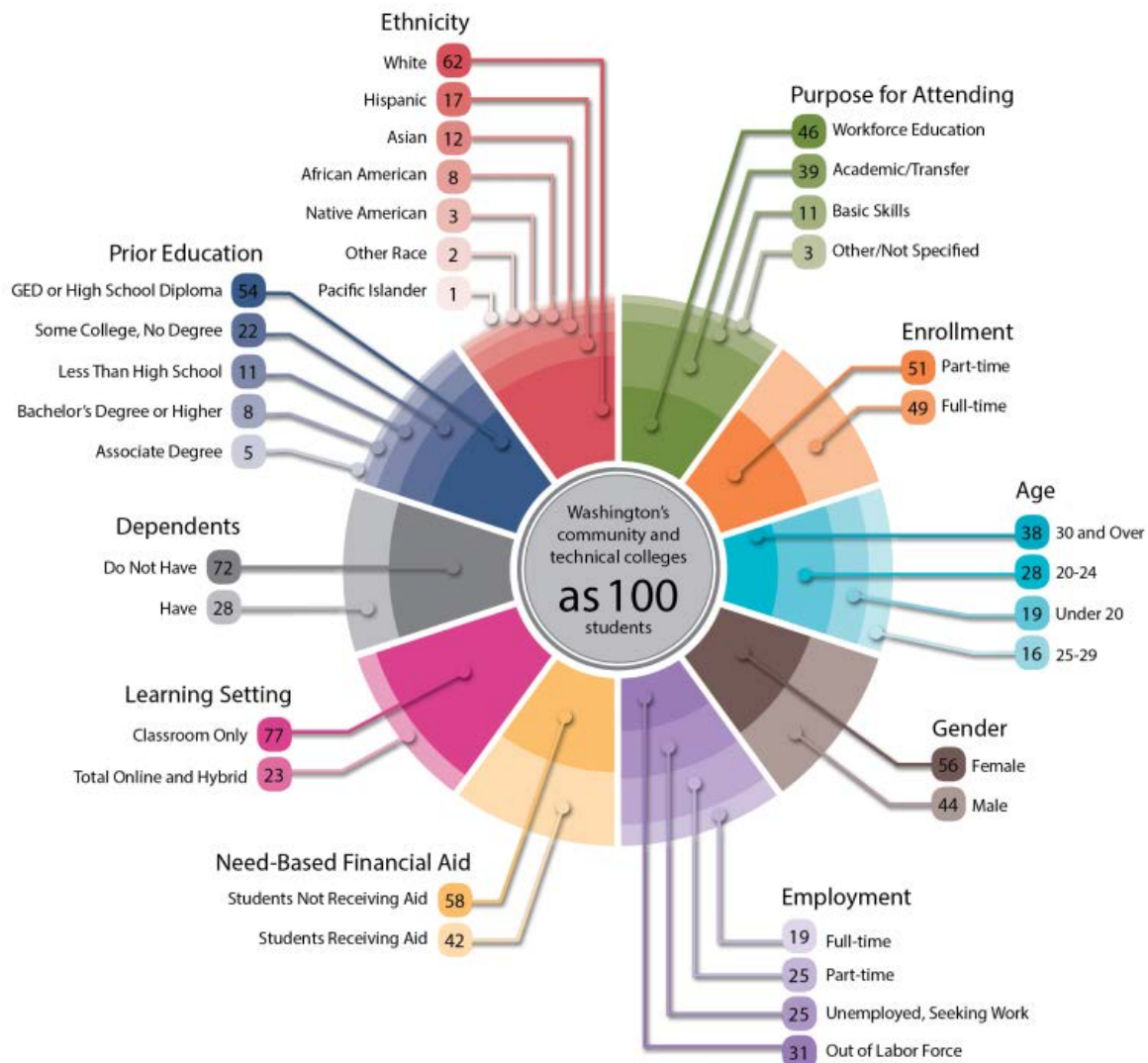


WASHINGTON'S COMMUNITY AND TECHNICAL COLLEGES AS 100 STUDENTS
