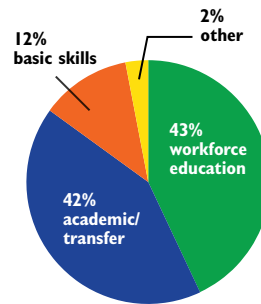

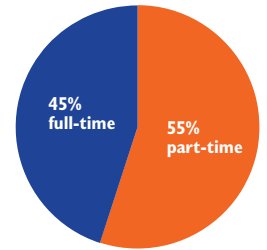

TechHire Program Helps Diverse Students Learn on the Job Low-income and underrepresented young people will have better access to career opportunities in the technology industry thanks to a \$3.8 million Department of Labor grant. Seattle Central is leading a diverse group of partner organizations to implement the TechHire program, which is built around a paid apprenticeship model. The program will help local technology companies identify diverse and qualified candidates while providing opportunities for students to learn on the job.

Groundbreaking Partnership Benefits Dental Hygiene Students Housed within Seattle Central's new Health Education Center is a community dental clinic that is changing the way students learn dental hygiene. Opening with the help of a groundbreaking partnership, the clinic operates under a dual education and service model, the first of its kind in the nation. Managed by Neighborcare Health, it serves primarily low-income patients and provides an on-site training opportunity to students in Seattle Central's Dental Hygiene bachelor's degree program and Seattle Vocational Institute's Dental Assisting program. They practice their skills under the close supervision of experienced dentists, and, in the process, provide Neighborcare with the ability to serve more patients.

Training the Next Generation of Mariners Seattle Central's Seattle Maritime Academy recently opened a new, 24,000-square-foot building that offers the latest instructional technology to train aspiring mariners. With four times more space, the expanded facility gives the academy the ability to grow in the future. This means more people in the community have the opportunity to train for rewarding, family-wage careers in a thriving industry. With the most advanced simulation equipment in the industry, the new building provides an unparalleled training experience for students and current maritime professionals in need of continuing education.
