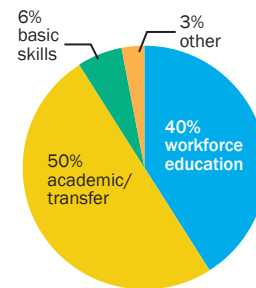

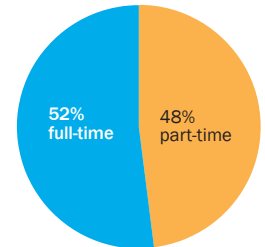

Shoreline Community College has a longstanding reputation for excellence in transfer to the University of Washington and top universities nationwide.
