Jan Yoshiwara introduced David Schumacher, Office of Financial Management director, and thanked him for his role in directing the Governor's Emergency Education Relief (GEER) funding, which was included as part of the CARES Act, to the system. David provided an overview of the state budget situation in light of the public health crisis. He noted that while the November revenue forecast was better than the September forecast, the Legislature will still face a \$3.8 billion shortfall when it reconvenes in January. He also discussed how capital budget investments can stimulate the economy and create valuable, long-term assets for colleges and local communities alike.

Critical Race Theory in Institutional Planning and Campus Design: A Case Study

Chief Diversity and Equity Officers Commission

The Chief Diversity and Equity Officers Commission would like to remove "Chief" from its name. The name change would reflect the commitment of sensitivity to indigenous communities, and restrict its use to those who have received the title through Native American recognition or inheritance/lineage.

COVID 19-related enrollment impacts on the allocation model

Last spring, as colleges saw unprecedented drops in enrollment due to the COVID-19 pandemic, several college leaders expressed concern about the impact these enrollment anomalies might have on enrollment-based funding through the allocation model. Presidents raised possibilities such as freezing the allocation model, excluding all of the 2019-20 enrollments from the 3-year enrollment averages, and annualizing fall 2019 enrollments. At WACTC's request, the Business Affairs Commission (BAC) reviewed these and some additional options. In April, BAC came back to WACTC with the following recommendation:

- Do not freeze the allocation model.
- The system does not need to settle these questions immediately as 2019-20 enrollment does not factor into allocations until 2021-22.
- Allow BAC to review the final 2019-20 enrollment data in the fall of 2020 and return with recommendations at that time.

In October, BAC met to review and assess several options for adjusting 2019-20 enrollment data to minimize negative funding impacts due to COVID-19.

At this time, BAC recommends that WACTC make no changes to the allocation model or base enrollments. While certain colleges have experienced disproportionate enrollment impacts due to COVID-19, those will have no effect on the allocations in the coming 2021-22 fiscal year. This is due to the protective factor in the base enrollment formula whereby full-time equivalences (FTE) are only shifted to colleges exceeding their targets. No districts will exceed its target in the 2021-22 allocation model. Additionally, the committee explored several adjustment methodologies, but none of them resulted in a significant fiscal impact. Considering the likelihood of an allocation model review in the near future, BAC advises WACTC to maintain the status quo in 2021-22 allocations. COVID-19 impacts on enrollments could be a factor in a future review of the enrollment target formula.

WACTC accepted BAC's recommendation to make no changes to the allocation model or base enrollments.

Allocation model assessment

The committee disturbed the guiding principles and criteria by which to measure whether the allocation model is adhering to the guiding principles.
