#### Notes on Application to a University or College

- 1. Admissions application deadlines vary; students must meet the deadline for the university or universities to which they plan to apply for admission to transfer.
- 2. [Note, if needed, on competitive GPA needed for admission consideration.]

### Associate Degrees developed under this agreement shall:

- Meet the requirements of the statewide [Direct Transfer Agreement or Associate in Science-Transfer Agreement] as it applies to both for institutions party to this agreement and other institutions party to the statewide [DTA/AS-T] agreement. If admitted to the baccalaureate institution, students will have junior standing. Student seeking admission to **public institutions** will be given priority in the admission decision for admission to the <u>institution</u> over similarly qualified transfer applicants without a transfer associate degree. Admission to an institution does not guarantee admission to a specific program or major.
- Be issued only to students who have earned a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.00, as calculated by the degree awarding institution. Specific grade requirements vary from course to course and among transfer institutions. Students must check with the transfer institution.
